In total, San Francisco Public Works recorded 10,518 nighttime uses of the restrooms, or roughly 3,200 uses per month.

What had been a three-month pilot will run through June 2020, the end of the fiscal year, allowing City leaders to evaluate the potential to continue or expand the program in the upcoming City budget. The 22 other Pit Stops in the program are open between seven and 13 hours a day, depending on location.

The three 24-hour facilities are located at Sixth and Jessie streets in SoMa, Market and Castro streets in the Castro, and Eddy and Jones streets in the Tenderloin.

Preliminary results from the pilot program at the 24-hour Pit Stops show that roughly 25 percent of all flushes at the overnight locations are happening between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m.

In total, San Francisco Public Works recorded 10,518 nighttime uses of the restrooms, or roughly 3,200 uses per month. During that time, the volume of steam cleaning requests in the surrounding quarter mile went down at all three locations.

Instead of the one staffer assigned to each Pit Stop during the daytime and evening hours, two attendants are on duty during the late-night hours for safety considerations. A nonprofit

workforce development partner, Urban Alchemy, staffs all but one of the Pit Stops; the Lower Polk Community Benefit District staffs the other. Public Works manages the program.

The initial pilot cost \$299,594 to operate; the extension will cost a projected \$580,315 more.

Public Works began the Pit Stop program five years ago, starting with three locations in the Tenderloin. It now operates at 25 locations in 13 neighborhoods. Collectively, the staffed bathrooms have logged more than 1.6 million collective uses since the program's inception.

"We know that when the holidays roll around, it's our City's time to shine and the Holiday Eco Blitz will help us do just that," said Public Works Director Mohammed Nuru.

The operation has crews on the job every day during the winter holiday season, boosting regularly scheduled cleaning and maintenance services. The work includes sweeping and steam cleaning sidewalks, clearing leaves and litter from catch basins, and removing illegal postings from poles. The program also includes pruning street trees and weeding basins, cleaning public trashcans and street furniture, sprucing up around bus stops, painting over graffiti, power washing roadways, filling potholes and educating merchants and property owners about their responsibility to keep sidewalks clean.

Public Works is leading the effort, with the support of many City partners, including the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency, San Francisco Public Utilities Commission, the City Administrator's Office, San Francisco Recreation and Park Department, San Francisco Police Department, the Port of San Francisco, and the Office

of Economic and Workforce Development. Nonprofits also are collaborating, among them Yerba Buena Community Benefit District (CBD), South Beach/ Rincon Hill/Mission Bay CBD, East Cut CBD, Fisherman's Wharf CBD, and the Union Square Business Improvement District.

Between holiday shopping, special events and the general increase in visitors we see during the holiday season, we want to make sure everyone has a safe and pleasant experience when they're enjoying San Francisco. The Holiday Eco Blitz is part of the Love Our City campaign, which Mayor London Breed launched in September 2018 with a citywide volunteer cleanup with nearly 1,000 participants.

The campaign aims to create a collective resolve where everyone who lives and works in San Francisco pitches in to care for the City's diverse neighborhoods.

The turkeys were provided by the City with the support of the A. Phillip Randolph Institute, Whole Foods and Foster Farms.

Breed was joined at three of the distribution sites by Oakland Mayor Libby Schaaf and San Jose Mayor Sam Liccardo as part of a friendly wager for September's Battle for the Bay Coastal Cleanup – a volunteer event that brought out more than 6,000 volunteers to clean and beautify our coastline neighborhoods. Following the cleanup event, the mayors agreed to continue collaborating on volunteer events that benefit all three cities.

The workday, which was co-sponsored by District 7 Supervisor Norman Yee's office, kicked off at Lowell High School on Eucalyptus Drive. From there, volunteers broke off into teams to beautify a total of 12 locations, ranging from community gardens, to street medians and commercial corridors.

In addition to cleaning up public spaces around the neighborhood, our corporate partner, Recology, provided bulky item disposal and free compost to residents from both District 7 and 5.
